Feel free to answer these questions out loud when your leader reads them or you can quietly reflect and write a response in your workbook.

PRAY FOR ONE-ANOTHER:


Please focus this time on *your own personal* praises and requests instead of listing all of the bad things that happened to someone you know. We challenge you to get "deep" with one-another relationally, which means becoming a little bit vulnerable as you are honest with one-another.

2. Read Luke 23:39-43. Look carefully at the words spoken by the criminals. What actions of faith and remorse do you see from the repentant criminal?

3. Leaders, read the explanation of the criminals below. How does this impact the way you think of this salvation story?

4. Read Matthew 20:1-16. How does this parable relate to the criminal on the cross next to Jesus?

5. This parable is surrounded by parallel statements in Matthew 19:30 and 20:16. Why do you think they are placed at the beginning and end of this parable?

6. If you were one of the first workers hired, how would you have reacted to the landowner? How should this parable impact your view toward others who follow Jesus?

7. If we can come in at the last minute and receive the same reward, why should we continue working hard now? What is wrong with this thinking?

CHANGE QUESTIONS

- 1. What kind of worker are you in the Kingdom of God? Long-time hard worker? Disgruntled employee looking for equal pay? Lazy worker hoping to get paid? Latecomer just hoping to receive anything?
- 2. How can you keep from being judgmental or jealous of others who have not worked as long or as hard as you?


