#### **HOW TO USE THIS GUIDE:**

#### **CHANGE QUESTIONS:**

At the end of Jesus' most famous sermon, he says that if you do not put his words into practice then you are a fool [Matthew 7:24-27]. Life transformation is the ultimate goal of a follower of Christ. Feel free to answer these questions out-loud when your leader reads them or you can quietly reflect and write a response in your workbook.

#### PRAY FOR ONE-ANOTHER:

Please focus this time on *your own personal* praises and requests instead of listing all of the bad things that happened to someone you know. We challenge you to get "deep" with one-another relationally, which means becoming a little bit vulnerable as you are honest with one-another.

#### PRAY FOR THE MISSIONS OF THE WEEK:

WCC supports many wonderful missionaries and organizations all over the world. We are committed to support them with our finances as well as our prayers and encouragement. Ask God to work in their lives and through their ministries to ignite a passion for Jesus in others.

#### **DAILY DEVOTION:**

Be consistent, honest, and intentional with this time and you will not regret it. The whole point of this workbook is to make the sermons and Scriptures stick with you in your daily walk with Christ. Digging in to God's Word and applying it to your daily life is perhaps the best way to solidify His truth into your heart and your life.

6.	Read James 1:9-11. James gives a practical example of what it looks like to be double minded. How does this example show what it means to be mature and have wisdom?
7.	Read James 1:12. What are the rewards for those who persevere? What does it look like for people to undergo trials today? What would it look like for you to stand the test?

"1James, a servant of God and of the Lord Jesus Christ, To the twelve tribes scattered among the nations: Greetings.

2Consider it pure joy, my brothers and sisters, whenever you face trials of many kinds, 3because you know that the testing of your faith produces perseverance. 4Let perseverance finish its work so that you may be mature and complete, not lacking anything. 5If any of you lacks wisdom, you should ask God, who gives generously to all without finding fault, and it will be given to you. 6But when you ask, you must believe and not doubt, because the one who doubts is like a wave of the sea, blown and tossed by the wind. 7That person should not expect to receive anything from the Lord. 8Such a person is double-minded and unstable in all they do.

9Believers in humble circumstances ought to take pride in their high position. 10But the rich should take pride in their humiliation—since they will pass away like a wild flower. 11For the sun rises with scorching heat and withers the plant; its blossom falls and its beauty is destroyed. In the same way, the rich will fade away even while they go about their business.

12Blessed is the one who perseveres under trial because, having stood the test, that person will receive the crown of life that the Lord has promised to those who love him."

"13When tempted, no one should say, "God is tempting me." For God cannot be tempted by evil, nor does he tempt anyone; 14but each person is tempted when they are dragged away by their own evil desire and enticed. 15Then, after desire has conceived, it gives birth to sin; and sin, when it is full-grown, gives birth to death.

16Don't be deceived, my dear brothers and sisters. 17Every good and perfect gift is from above, coming down from the Father of the heavenly lights, who does not change like shifting shadows. 18He chose to give us birth through the word of truth, that we might be a kind of firstfruits of all he created."

- Why do you think James wants you to know God does not tempt anyone? How does that make you feel?



### DAILY DEVOTION [JAMES 1:19-27]

"19My dear brothers and sisters, take note of this: Everyone should be quick to listen, slow to speak and slow to become angry, 20because human anger does not produce the righteousness that God desires. 21Therefore, get rid of all moral filth and the evil that is so prevalent and humbly accept the word planted in you, which can save you.

22Do not merely listen to the word, and so deceive yourselves. Do what it says. 23Anyone who listens to the word but does not do what it says is like someone who looks at his face in a mirror 24and, after looking at himself, goes away and immediately forgets what he looks like. 25But whoever looks intently into the perfect law that gives freedom, and continues in it—not forgetting what they have heard, but doing it—they will be blessed in what they do.

26Those who consider themselves religious and yet do not keep a tight rein on their tongues deceive themselves, and their religion is worthless. 27Religion that God our Father accepts as pure and faultless is this: to look after orphans and widows in their distress and to keep oneself from being polluted by the world."

### DAILY DEVOTION [JAMES 2:1-13]

"1My brothers and sisters, believers in our glorious Lord Jesus Christ must not show favoritism.

2Suppose a man comes into your meeting wearing a gold ring and fine clothes, and a poor man in filthy old clothes also comes in. 3If you show special attention to the man wearing fine clothes and say, "Here's a good seat for you," but say to the poor man, "You stand there" or "Sit on the floor by my feet," 4have you not discriminated among yourselves and become judges with evil thoughts?

5Listen, my dear brothers and sisters: Has not God chosen those who are poor in the eyes of the world to be rich in faith and to inherit the kingdom he promised those who love him? 6But you have dishonored the poor. Is it not the rich who are exploiting you? Are they not the ones who are dragging you into court? 7Are they not the ones who are blaspheming the noble name of him to whom you belong?

8If you really keep the royal law found in Scripture, "Love your neighbor as yourself," you are doing right. 9But if you show favoritism, you sin and are convicted by the law as lawbreakers. 10For whoever keeps the whole law and yet stumbles at just one point is guilty of breaking all of it. 11For he who said, "You shall not commit adultery," also said, "You shall not murder." If you do not commit adultery but do commit murder, you have become a lawbreaker.

12Speak and act as those who are going to be judged by the law that gives freedom, 13because judgment without mercy will be shown to anyone who has not been merciful. Mercy triumphs over judgment.



4.	Read James 2:18-19. What do you think is the difference between the words "belief" and "faith"? Why is it important for us to know the difference when we read Scripture?
5.	Read James 2:20-24. Why do you think James chose to use Abraham as an example? Why is verse 22 so significant?
6.	Read James 2:25-26. James uses the word "dead" [3x] and "useless" [1x] in this chapter to describe a non-saving faith. Why would he use such harsh words to describe a good thing like faith?
7.	What may keep people from putting faith into action in our workplaces, neighborhoods, and other areas outside of the church?

### DAILY DEVOTION [JAMES 2:14-26]

"14What good is it, my brothers and sisters, if someone claims to have faith but has no deeds? Can such faith save them? 15Suppose a brother or a sister is without clothes and daily food. 16If one of you says to them, "Go in peace; keep warm and well fed," but does nothing about their physical needs, what good is it? 17In the same way, faith by itself, if it is not accompanied by action, is dead.

18But someone will say, "You have faith; I have deeds."

Show me your faith without deeds, and I will show you my faith by my deeds. 19You believe that there is one God. Good! Even the demons believe that—and shudder.

20You foolish person, do you want evidence that faith without deeds is useless? 21Was not our father Abraham considered righteous for what he did when he offered his son Isaac on the altar? 22You see that his faith and his actions were working together, and his faith was made complete by what he did. 23And the scripture was fulfilled that says, "Abraham believed God, and it was credited to him as righteousness," and he was called God's friend. 24You see that a person is considered righteous by what they do and not by faith alone.

25In the same way, was not even Rahab the prostitute considered righteous for what she did when she gave lodging to the spies and sent them off in a different direction? 26As the body without the spirit is dead, so faith without deeds is dead."

#### DAY 1: James 2:14

- When have you made a bold claim that you could not back up? Did you suffer any consequences for that claim?
- What is the danger of claiming to have faith but never actually showing it with your actions? How can you avoid this?

#### OVERVIEW OF JAMES:

#### WHY READ THIS BOOK?

If you're looking for practical ways to live as a Christian, you've come to the right book. James shows that it's possible to believe the right things, yet live the wrong way. This book will also show you how to turn right doctrine into right living.

#### WHO WROTF THIS BOOK?

No one knows for sure which James wrote this letter. Most believe the writer was James, Jesus' brother [Gal. 1:19].

#### TO WHOM WAS IT WRITTEN?

The twelve tribes [1:1], meaning either the people of Israel who had become believers in Christ, or the church in a symbolic sense [Gal. 6:16], including both Jewish and Gentile believers.

#### WHY WAS IT WRITTEN?

To warn believers of some habits they had developed that undermined the essence of what they believed—things such as favoritism, slander, pride, the misuse of wealth, and a lack of patience. Obedient living would increase their witness to those scattered among the nations [1:1].

#### WHEN WAS IT WRITTEN?

James may have been the first New Testament book to be written - perhaps between AD 40 and 50.

#### WHAT TO LOOK FOR IN JAMES?

This letter takes a no-nonsense approach to hypocrisy. James describes the evil of a tongue out of control, showing favoritism toward the rich, and boasting about plans for tomorrow. Don't look for pious platitudes here; expect a string of hard-hitting, specific, practical instructions to help you live an authentic Christian life.
